WHEREAS, Local Government Aid (LGA) is a critical need for our city; and,

WHEREAS, LGA provides funding to restrain property taxes on homeowners and businesses; and,

WHEREAS, LGA provides for basic services such as public safety, infrastructure and fire protection; and,

WHEREAS, the legislature and state agencies have imposed unfunded mandates upon local cities, including increased pension requirements, expensive wastewater infrastructure costs, among other mandates; and,

WHEREAS, an LGA increase would help the City of Fairmont maintain staffing and service levels; and,

WHEREAS, no Omnibus Tax Bill was passed by the 2015 legislature, thus freezing the LGA appropriation.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City of Fairmont supports an increase in the base appropriation for Local Government Aid of \$45.5 million effective for aid payable in 2017 and urges adoption of this proposal by the House and Senate.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be sent to the following: the legislators representing the City of Fairmont, Speaker of the House Rep. Kurt Daudt, Senate Majority Leader Sen. Tom Bakk, House Tax Chair Rep. Greg Davids, Senate Tax Chair Sen. Rod Skoe, and Governor Mark Dayton.

The meeting of the Board of Zoning Appeals was convened at 4:30 p.m. in the City Hall Council Chambers by Vice Chair McMillan.

Minutes: On a motion by Unke, seconded by Davison it was unanimously decided to approve the minutes of the October 5, 2015 meeting as presented.

Vice Chair McMillan introduced the variance request by Danny Klous at 803 E. 12th Street. Mr. Klous is requesting a front yard variance of thirty (30) feet in lieu of the forty (40) feet for a front yard for a proposed storage building development. Humpal reviewed the request noting that Mr. Klous purchased the property to the south of 1250 N Dewey Street and combined the two lots. Doing this changed the definition of the front yard. The two variances granted by the Board October 5th for 1250 N Dewey Street would carry over to this lot. Granting the variance would not alter the essential character of the light industrial area, would not impair adequate supply of the air and light to the adjacent property, diminish property values or impair the public health, safety or welfare of our residents. The rear yard abuts vacated railroad property and the front yard request is larger than some front yards in the area. Granting this variance would not set a precedent since numerous front and rear yard variances have been granted. Staff recommends approval. Harris made the motion to grant the variance as presented. The motion was seconded by Davison.

There being no other business to come before the Board, Unke made the motion to adjourn the meeting at 4:35 p.m. The motion was seconded by Davison and carried.
