The minutes of the Fairmont City Council meeting held on Monday, March 26, 2018 at the City Hall Council Chambers.

Mayor Deborah Foster called the meeting to order at 5:30 p.m.

Mayor Deborah Foster, Council Members Ruth Cyphers, Tom Hawkins, Wayne Hasek, Bruce Peters and Jim Zarling were present. Also in attendance: City Administrator Mike Humpal, Public Works Director/City Engineer Troy Nemmers, Finance Director Paul Hoye, City Attorney Elizabeth W. Bloomquist and Chief of Police Mike Hunter.

It was moved by Council Member Peters to approve the agenda with the addition of the control sheet for item 16.1 Accounts Payable. Council Member Hasek seconded the motion and the motion carried.

It was moved by Council Member Cyphers, seconded by Council Member Hasek and carried to approve the minutes of the regular City Council meeting of March 12, 2018.

Members of the Fairmont Soccer Association updated the City Council on the Soccer Association's activities and its value to the City. Kristin Thingstad, Chris Johnston, Mike Dietz, and Matt Tennyson all spoke. The Association made a plea to volunteers to help staff a Director's position for summer recreational soccer.

### **RESOLUTION 2018-11**

# RESOLUTION TO APPLY TO PARTICIPATE IN THE NATIONAL FLOOD INSURANCE PROGRAM

WHEREAS, certain areas of the city of Fairmont are subject to periodic flooding or flood-related erosion, causing serious damages to properties within these areas; and,

**WHEREAS**, relief is available in the form of federally subsidized flood insurance as authorized by the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968; and,

**WHEREAS**, it is the intent of the Fairmont City Council to require the recognition and evaluation of flood or flood-related erosion hazards in all official actions relating to land use in areas having these hazards; and,

**WHEREAS**, this body has the legal authority to adopt land use and control measures to reduce future flood losses pursuant to Minnesota Statutes Chapters 103F and 462.

### NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Fairmont City Council hereby:

- 1. Assures the Federal Emergency Management Agency that it will enact as necessary in those areas having flood or flood-related erosion hazards, adequate land use and control measures with effective enforcement provisions, including:
- a. Require permits for all proposed construction or other development in the community so that it may determine whether such construction or other development is proposed with the floodplain.
- b. Review proposed development to assure that all necessary permits have been received from those governmental agencies from which approval is required by Federal or State Law.
- c. Review and maintain all permit applications to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably safe from flooding.
- d. Review and maintain all permit applications to ensure that any development activities are consistent with criteria set forth in Section 60.3 of the National Flood Insurance Program Regulations.
- 2. Vests the Community Development Director with the responsibility, authority and means to:
- a. Assist the FEMA Administrator, at his request, in his delineation of the limits of the area having special flood or flood-related erosion hazards.
- b. Provide such information as the FEMA Administrator may request concerning present uses and occupancy of the floodplain or flood-related erosion areas.

- c. Cooperate with federal, state and local agencies and private firms which undertake a study, survey, map and identify floodplain or flood-related erosion areas and cooperate with neighboring communities with respect to management of adjoining floodplain and/or flood-related erosion areas in order to prevent aggravation or existing hazards.
- d. Submit on the anniversary date of the community's initial eligibility an annual report to the FEMA Administrator on the progress made during the past year within the community in the development and implementation of floodplain management measures.
- e. Upon occurrence, notify the FEMA Administrator, in writing, whenever the boundaries of the community have been modified by annexation or the community has otherwise assumed or no longer has authority to adopt and enforce floodplain management regulations for a particular area. In order that all Flood Hazard Boundary Rate Maps accurately represent the community's boundaries, include within such notification a copy of a map of the community suitable for reproduction, clearly delineating the new corporate limits or new area for which the community has assumed or relinquished floodplain management regulatory authority.
- f. Ensure that the community's Flood Insurance Rate Maps are maintained and kept current by providing the Federal Emergency Management Agency with any new or updated flood risk data or any modified date reflecting natural or man-made changes to the floodplain.
- 3. Appoints the Community Development Director to maintain for public inspection and to furnish upon request, for the determination of applicable flood insurance risk premium rates within all areas having special flood hazards identified on a Flood Hazard Boundary Map or Flood Insurance Rate Map, any certificates of flood-proofing and information on the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) of the level of the lowest floor (including basement) of all new or substantially improved structures and include whether or not such structures contain a basement, and if the structure as been flood proofed the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) to which the structure was floodproofed.
- 4. Agrees to take such other official action as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the objectives of the program.

Railroad Quiet Zone

Councilor Hawkins had a request from a citizen for Fairmont to research Quiet Zones. A Quiet Zone is an area of, or the entire community which prohibits the use of train whistles as a warning sign. This issue has come up several times over the years, most recently I addressed the City Council in 2015.

My contact at Mn/DOT is Dennis Williams, Project Manager Rail Administrator. The short answer that I received was that for Fairmont to adopt a Quiet Zone, we must place crossing gates at each grade crossing within Fairmont City Limits. Indus Street, Prairie Avenue, Pioneer Drive and Fairlakes would all require a Midian System and Gates (crossing arms). In 2015, Crossing gates cost approximately \$250,000 per crossing. Median Construction per crossing is an additional \$40,000 for a total of \$290,000, multiplied by four is \$1,160,000.

Quiet Zones are the result of an action from the Community and not the railroad or the State. Therefore, there are no state or federal funds available to off-set the cost to the City. Of the 853 cities in Minnesota, 27 have Quiet Zones.

There is some discussion at Mn/DOT that Prairie Avenue could have an Average Daily Traffic Count high enough to warrant crossing gates. Mn/DOT would pay 100% if the traffic counts warrant.

The other issue raised lately concerning the railroad are the long delays. This is a problem as trains can be a mile long. Minn. Stat. 219.383, Subd. 3 prohibit the railroad from allowing a train to block a grade crossing for longer than ten minutes, a moving train is exempt. The difficulty here is if the City wants to issue a citation, it must be issued to the company not the locomotive Engineer. Further, cities have minimal authority to regulate railroad and or their action and operation.
