Electric Department


Department Information

• 10 full-time employees

Statistics/Data

- 6,089 electric meters
- 136.61 miles of electric distribution system are maintained
- 11 miles of 69KV transmission lines
- 3 substations & 1,474 transformers













Electric Department

- Replacement of 3 high voltage switches, moving from live front to dead front for reliability and safety
- Installation of LED lighting at Veterans Park
- Installed meters for Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) network
- Recognized by the American Power Association & Southern Minnesota Municipal Power Agency (SMMPA) for excellence in electric reliability



Wastewater Department

Department Information

- 5 full-time employees
- 1 seasonal employee

Statistics/Data

- Treated 457,490,000 gallons of wastewater
 - 99.03 % removal of CBOD
 - 96.77 % removal of TSS
 - 89.21 % removal of Phosphorus
 - 98.12 % removal of Ammonia

- Replacement of pumps and electrical panels at lift stations
 - Johnson Street
- Albion/Lair
- Albion/Webster
- Woodland/Lake Park Blvd
- Sliplined 7,800 feet sanitary sewer
- Comprehensive cleaning of anerobic digesters
- Rebuilt a waste tank mixer and a return activated sludge pump





Water Department

Department Information

- 11 full-time employees
- 1 seasonal employee

Statistics/Data

- 504,224,494 gallons of water treated
- 1,289 tons of lime sludge produced
- 565 hydrants and 88 miles of water mains
- 3 water towers, 2 ground storage tanks and 1 industrial booster station

- Installed new servers
- Completed restoration work to close lime ponds
- Completed the Nitrate Bioreactor project
- Implemented a polymer blend system and a fluoride feed system
- Updated leak locating equipment
- Repaired 17 water leaks







Airport

Department Information

- 1 full-time employee
- 35 based aircraft onsite, with 0 hangar slots available
- 8 buildings
- Approximately 35 acres of pavement
- Two 10,000-gallon fiberglass underground fuel storage tanks

Statistics/Data

- Increase of jet fuel sales by 15.5% (44,592 gallons)
- Increase of gas sales by 12% (27,415 gallons)
- 9,400 operations, based on FAA Airport Master Record (5010)





Park Department

Highlights

- Upgraded Sylvania Park concession building, incubator building and Wastewater Treatment Facility
- Planted and cared for 1,050 flowers and 25 new trees with over 44,000 gallons water used to hydrate the plantings
- Installed 6 donated park benches
- Trimmed over 2,000 trees and removed 100+ trees, many with Emerald Ash Borer
- Annual participation in Arbor Day Celebration, fall leaf collection program and city-wide clean up events

Street Department

Department Information

- 11 full-time employees
- 1 seasonal employee

Statistics/Data

- Maintenance and repair to more than:
 - 74 miles of streets and alleys
- 41 miles of storm sewer

- 8 bridges

- 1,932 storm sewer catch basins
- 15+ storm sewer grit structures
- 85 storm sewer outlets
- Maintain and annually inspect 45+ vehicles/trailers for DOT certification
- Maintenance and repair of entire city fleet
 - 25 large vehicles

- 14 heavy equipment machines

- 35 small equipment pieces

- 29 trailers

- 8 fire department vehicles
- Maintenance of tree/compost area
- Boulevard tree trimming, removal and stump removal
- Snow removal and storm cleanup





- Approximately 800 tons of blacktop were applied for street/parking lot asphalt repairs
- Over 10 tons of material were used for street/parking lot crack filling
- Application testing and use of a salt brine generator
- Ordered 200 tons street de-ice salt and 1,000 tons sand
- Annual participation in fall leaf collection program and city-wide clean up events

Aquatic Park

Department Information

• 66 seasonal employees



Statistics/Data

- Situated on 3.5 acres on the southern edge of Fairmont
- Seasonal operation since 1999
- Zero-depth kiddie pool, splash pool, diving pit and recreational pool with expansive sand lot and concession stand on site

Highlights

- Staffing restructure to include seasonal manager
- Completed repairs for kiddie/splash pool leaks
- Sold 229 season memberships
- 2022 open swim attendance: 21,060 visitors
